I prepare my heart for prayer

As I begin, I take a moment to become aware of the Lord present to me, looking upon me with love, desiring to speak to my heart.

Prayerfully, I read Mark 10:46-52

After prayerfully reading, I ask for a grace I desire in this time of prayer.

Using my reasoning:

- Think about what is happening in the scene; what are the action words?
- Who are the people in the scene? What is the place? What things are described?
- What words catch my attention? What does this mean to me?

Using my imagination:

- Imagining myself in the scene am I an observer or participant? To whom am I drawn?
- Using all of my senses what do I see? What do I hear? What do I feel, smell or taste?

Reflect on what God is saying to my heart:

- As I reflect, I use my spiritual senses to acknowledge what is transpiring in my heart my thoughts, feelings and desires. (Acknowledge means to see, to notice, to become aware of, to name.)

 This is important to do, as my thoughts, feelings and desires shape my actions.
- I look for the truth the Lord is communicating to me. I ask Jesus to give me his mind and his thoughts to see with the eyes of his heart what he wants to reveal to me today. How is Jesus calling me to apply this truth to my life?

Guided Reflection

Quoted from "An Ignatian Introduction to Prayer," by Father Timothy M Gallagher, O.M.V.¹

I see the crowds, the road as it leaves the city, the blind beggar seated by the road ... I am there with him ... perhaps I take his place, and, now, I am seated there, like him, waiting ...

He seeks to come to Jesus out of his great need, and his hope that in Jesus he will find healing. But he is helpless to approach the Lord ... I sense my own need, my own hope, my own helplessness.

I watch as he pours out his need and his hope in the repeated cry: "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" His cry becomes my cry too of my heart: "Jesus ... have mercy on me!" I make this prayer to the Lord ...

Jesus hears this cry. He stops. He says to the crowd: "Call him." I hear them say to me: "Take heart; rise, he is calling you." I feel my heart begin to lift with new hope ...

I stand before Jesus. Our eyes meet ... I see his face, I hear his words, his question to my heart: "What do you want me to do for you?" Now Jesus and I are alone in the midst of the crowd. And I speak to him from my heart, unhurriedly. I dare to tell him all that I hope he will do for me ... all that I hope for from this time of prayer ...

I say to him: "Master, let me receive my sight." Help me to see! Help me see my way clearly in the doubts and fears that my heart feels; help me to overcome the obstacle that keeps me from the closeness I desire with you ...

And, with Bartimaeus, I experience Jesus' word of healing ... I sense the love that pours out from him and brings healing, brings new hope into my life ...

I follow him along the way ...

After prayerfully reading, I ask for a grace I desire in this time of prayer.

Using my reasoning:

- Think about what is happening in the scene; what are the action words?
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Guided Reflection

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I sense the thrill of gratitude in the heart of Jesus as he lifts up his heart to the Father whom he so loves, and by whom he knows himself so deeply loved ... that same Father who says to me, as to Jesus: You are my beloved son, my beloved daughter ...

Jesus thanks his Father that he has revealed the mysteries of the kingdom not to the self-sufficient ... but to those who feel themselves helpless, dependent on God for everything, like a small infant I ask to be such ...

I ask Jesus, the Son who knows the Father, to reveal himself, to reveal the Father to me, in this time of prayer ... that he chooses to do this in my heart ...

Now he is close to me, speaking to my heart. I hear his invitation: "Come to me ... " I share with the Lord my own desire, now, in this time of prayer. Even as I sense my heartfelt longing to "come to him," to know that my heart is close to him ... I hear him say to me, with infinite love: I want you to come close, I invite you, I call you, "Come to me ..."

"You who labor and are heavily burdened ... I will give you rest." Lord, grant me the rest that my restless heart so seeks. I embrace this invitation. I come to the Lord bringing my burdens, my heart's laboring and weariness. I hear his promise of rest, heart's rest ...

"Take my yoke upon you and learn from me ... for I am gentle and lowly of heart." Two words. Lord, you are gentle, you are lowly of heart. I ponder each word ... There is no more room for fear ...

"Learn from me." I ask the Lord for this "learning" in these times of prayer ... This is the learning my heart most desires: personal learning, relational learning, learning of Jesus ..." And you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart are restless, until they rest in you" (St. Augustine). I seek the Lord, I seek his rest ...

JEREMIAH'S WORD OF HOPE ~ "I know the plans I have for you."

I prepare my heart for prayer

As I begin, I take a moment to become aware of the Lord present to me, looking upon me with love, desiring to speak to my heart.

Prayerfully, I read Jeremiah 29:11-14

After prayerfully reading, I ask for a grace I desire in this time of prayer.

Using my reasoning:

- Think about what is happening in the scene; what are the action words?
- Who are the people in the scene? What is the place? What things are described?
- What words catch my attention? What does this mean to me?

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I read the word of God, through the prophet Jeremiah, to his people in their time of exile.

Their hearts are heavy ... Their nation, their temple, all that was dear to them, has been destroyed, and they are reduced to a helpless group of exiles, far from their home. The present is dark; the future, too, seems without hope, and their exile continues ... My heart, too, knows such times ...

And in their hearts, in our hearts, is fear - fear that this has happened through our own fault, through our failure to love and serve the Lord as we were called to do ...

My heart too is afraid ... I too fear that I am not what I ought to be, that I fail the Lord ... Even in this time of prayer ... will I respond to the Lord?

The Lord speaks to them ... and the Lord speaks personally to my heart, here, in this moment of prayer.

"I know the plans I have for you ... plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope." I feel my anxieties about the future, about what lies ahead for me, about what will happen in my spiritual life, my prayer ...

I know that my desire to grow in love is real, but I feel so weak, so helpless ... and I am afraid. But now I hear this word of the Lord to me: "I know the plans I have for you ..." I hear these words, deeply, I read them, I reread them ...

"You will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will hear you." My heart lifts at this promise: "and I will hear you." Lord, now, today, I call upon you, I come to you, I pray to you ...

"You will seek me and find me." I speak to the Lord of my greatest desire: I seek you ... My heart opens as I hear your promise to me: and you will find me ...

"I will restore your fortunes ..." A new hope ... that my heart can truly change, can truly heal, can truly grow in love: "I will restore ..."

My heart lifts up as I hear the Lord speak these words personally to me ... offering me new hope, new trust, as I live my calling in his service, as I look to what lies ahead ...

I linger over these words, I read them, I hear the Lord speak to me. My heart responds.

FEAR NOT ~ "You are precious in my eyes, / and honored, and I love you"

I prepare my heart for prayer

Prayerfully, I read Isaiah 43:1-7

After prayerfully reading, I ask for a grace I desire in this time of prayer.

Using my reasoning:

- Think about what is happening in the scene; what are the action words?
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Guided Reflection

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God speaks to the heart of the exiled people ... and to me.

I sense the Lord with me, speaking these words to me. I read them slowly, tasting them, allowing their meaning to enter into my soul ... I stay with the words that most speak to me, without hurry ...

"Thus says the Lord, he who created you ... he who formed you ..." With the people of Israel, I again become aware of God at the origin of my being, of my belonging to his people. I sense the mystery of an eternal love that surrounds my whole being, my beginning, my life ...

"Fear not": the word so often repeated by Jesus. I speak to the Lord of the fears in my heart: of my inadequacy, my failure, my slowness to respond ... Again and again I hear his word: "Fear not."

"For I have redeemed you." I am your protector, I am at your side, I am with you; you are not alone. My power and my love accompany you ... I hear the Lord speak his words to me ...

"I have called you by name, you are mine." I think now of my own name. I hear the Lord pronounce my name, giving me my identity, giving me life, making me his own, telling me that I am not alone ... In the silent depth of my heart, I hear the Lord pronounce my name ... again, again ... I respond ...

"When you pass through the waters I will be with you; / and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; / when you walk through fire, you shall not be burned": the symbol of the most dangerous situations, situations which threaten life itself ... and these will be powerless to harm me. I will keep you unharmed even in the most difficult situations in life ... A new trust dawns in my heart ...

"Because you are precious in my eyes, / and honored, and I love you." Three words. With deep attention I ponder each: you are *precious* in my eyes; you are *honored* in my eyes; I *love* you. I dare to hear the Lord say these words to his people Israel ... and to me ...

Now my heart replies to the Lord who speaks his love to me ...

As I begin, I take a moment to become aware of the Lord present to me, looking upon me with love, desiring to speak to my heart.

Prayerfully, I read Psalm 139:1-18

After prayerfully reading, I ask for a grace I desire in this time of prayer.

Using my reasoning:

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This psalm is a prayer, words spoken from the human heart to God. I make these words my own. I say them to the God who is present to me now ...

A psalm of wonder, of marveling at the closeness of God to me: "You have searched me and known me!" My heart ponders this marvel, that the infinite and eternal God knows me, that I am important to him ...

"You know when I sit and stand; / you understand my thoughts ... Even before a word is on my tongue, / Lord, you know it all." Again this sense of marvel, that God is so intimately close to me, always, faithfully, sharing with me the hidden depths of my heart, my hopes, my struggles, my thoughts ... I invite him into my heart ...

"Behind and before you encircle me / and rest your hand upon me ..." His loving and protecting hand is always with me ... No matter where I am, "your hand will guide me, / your right hand holds me fast." You are faithfully with me, at all times, in all the places of my life ...

A psalm of wonder, of marveling now at God's eternal love, *calling me into being*: "You knit me in my mother's womb." I sense the Love that lies at the origin of my being, that gave me life, that gives me life each day, that tells me that I am valued and loved ...

My heart speaks now to the Lord: "I praise you ... / wonderful are your works." Gratitude awakens in my heart. My heart sings its wonder, its praise, to my God ...

"How precious to me are your designs, O God." Here, in my prayer, I ponder the loving designs of God. They become precious to me anew; they give me hope, a sense of the meaning of my life.

I read, I reread, the words of this Psalm, allowing God to show me their meaning ...

And now my heart replies to the Lord ...

After prayerfully reading, I ask for a grace I desire in this time of prayer.

Using my reasoning:

- Think about what is happening in the scene; what are the action words?
- Who are the people in the scene? What is the place? What things are described?
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Guided Reflection

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I have heard the Lord speak to me of his faithful love for me, calling me into being, giving a purpose to my life. Now a hope, a desire arises in my heart to respond with complete availability to God's call – like many before me, like Mary: "Behold, I am the handmaid ..."

I hear the Lord call me, as he does Jeremiah, to go down to the potter's house. I go, I see the potter seated at his work place, with his potter's wheel, with the clay he takes in his hand.

I watch him mold the clay, unmake the vessel and reshape it anew, as seems best to him. I note the total availability of the clay in his hands, ready to be shaped as he chooses.

"Behold, like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand ..."

I spend unhurried time with the potter, I watch him work, shaping, reshaping ... I let this image speak to me of God at work in my life, over the years, now, shaping, reshaping ...

I ask the grace to be available to this divine action, to place no obstacles, to be ready to be shaped as the Lord chooses, the Lord who loves me: in situations of health, of work, in relationships, in the changes and unforeseen events of my life ...

I enter deeply into the heat of Jesus, who, upon entering the world, says to the Father whom he loves: "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, / but a body you have prepared for me ... Then I said, 'Behold, I have come to do your will, O God ...'" (Heb 10:5-7).

"Behold, I have come to do your will, O God": these are the words that guide Jesus' entire life and mission. I offer my own will now to the Lord. I ask the grace to be more open, more like clay in the hands of the divine potter ... I too now say with Jesus: "I have come to do your will ..."

Converse with God²

"After these things God tested Abraham" – a test that will lead to an outpouring of blessings ...

I live with Abraham this moment when God asks of him what is dearest to his heart, and Abraham is ready to say "yes" to God, even in this ...

How ready am I to say "yes" to all that the Lord may be asking of me now? To his call to relinquish something, to take some new step, that will lead me closer to him, that will help me respond more fully to his love for me, to his plan for me?

I marvel at the faith and availability to God that Abraham shows here. With a trusting heart, I ask God for that same faith, that same availability ...

I am with Abraham when God calls him: "Abraham!" "Here am I." My heart too says, "Here am I," open to your call ...

I sense all that stirs in Abraham's heart when God asks a sacrifice that touches the deep places in his heart: "your only son Isaac, whom you love."

And Abraham simply obeys ... trusting in the faithful love of the God who asks this of him ...

I watch the journey to the mount; I hear the question of his son, Isaac: "Behold, the fire and the wood; but where is the lamb ...?" And Abraham's reply: "God will provide himself the lamb ..."

On the mount, God again calls: "Abraham!" "Here am I." "Do not lay your hand on the lad ..."

And God blesses the great availability of Abraham: "Because you have done this, and have not withheld your son ... I will indeed bless you and ... multiply your descendants as the stars of heaven ..."

Quoted from "An Ignatian Introduction to Prayer," by Father Timothy M Gallagher, O.M.V.¹

Now I turn to the Lord with a heartfelt plea. Like David (see the title to Psalm 51), I live this moment when my spiritual eyes suddenly see with clarity. Like David, I make no more excuses, I no longer try not to see ...

And from the most sincere depth of my heart, like him, I turn to the Lord seeking healing, daring to hope for a new and purified heart, to be set free from my obstacles to love ... to be given a new experience of the joy of healing.

I take up the words of this prayer, Psalm 51. I say them slowly to the Lord, pausing where my heart feels the need, repeating these words with sincerity, with hope, with trust in the love of the One with whom I speak ...

"Have mercy on me, O God, / according to your merciful love." "Have mercy on me" ... the mercy that heals, that restores to value ... that expresses unshakeable love ...

My heart feels this steadfast, this faithful love for me as I pray ...

"Wash me thoroughly ..." I dare, like David to ask even this ...

"For I know my transgressions \dots " I ask the Lord to give me this self-knowledge, the first precious step toward healing \dots

"Behold, you desire truth in the inward being \dots " This is the truth I seek: truth in the heart, this truth that you desire, that you love \dots

"Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow." "Make me hear joy and gladness ..." I ask this blessed washing, I desire this joy and gladness ...

I accompany Jesus as now he enters his time of sorrow, of burden, the time of the cross ... I ask him to show me, through his cross, the meaning of my own sorrows and burdens ...

I join Jesus and the Eleven as they walk alongside the city walls toward the Garden of Gethsemane ... It is night ... I hear the quiet sounds of the night, I feel the heaviness in the hearts of the disciples. My heart too knows times of heaviness and foreboding ...

Now I see Jesus go a little farther into the Garden ... and he is *alone*. The three near him sleep. Humanly, he is utterly alone, in his time of need. My heart too knows what it means to feel alone ... I speak to him ...

His energy fails him ... He falls on his face upon the earth, and a cry rises with anguish from his heart, to the Father: "If it is possible, let this cup pass from me ..." There is in Jesus a deep, deep desire to be freed of the burden he carries, the burden that lies ahead: "If it be possible, let this cup pass from me..." How often I too have prayed that prayer: *let this cup pass* ... the cup of physical weakness and pain, of responsibility, of struggles in relationships ... I am there with Jesus, prostrate on the earth ...

"Yet, not as I will, but as you will." Two wills: "as I will," "as you will." And, though it costs his humanity so much, Jesus bows his will to that of the Father ... I pray with him, I ask the courage to accept, like Jesus, the Father's will in my life ...

He comes, seeking the companionship and support of those close to him ... and they sleep ... But now I do not sleep ... I speak to him ...

Simon assists him ... What does this moment mean for Jesus? For Simon? The women weep for him. *Even now*, Jesus is not absorbed by his own pain, but continues to be alive to the need of others: "Do not weep for me; weep instead for yourselves ..."

He is *crucified*. ... I watch the painful stripping; I see the nailing of his hands and feet, the raising of the cross, I hear his tormented breathing ... I think of the times when I have felt – or now feel – crucified in some way, stripped of what is dear to me, nailed helplessly in situations of pain ... when each day brings its burden, its pain ... And I know that I am not alone ...

"They will look upon him whom they have pierced" (Jn 19:37). I do this now. I look upon the crucified Lord ... and he looks at me. We speak ...

"Father, forgive them ..." His first thought, his first word on the cross. I linger here, I ponder the forgiveness in the heart of Jesus. I ask for this forgiveness, I ask that forgiveness be my first thought as well ...

He is mocked ... but one heart turns to him in faith: "Jesus, remember me ..." I unite my voice, too, with this prayer ..." Today you will be with me ..."

Darkness falls, the curtain in the Temple is torn, Jesus cries out with a loud voice: "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." He gives up his life ... faithful to the end. He has given all, now, for me. I thank him ... I speak with him of the many "deaths" in my life, the losses, the letting go ...

Now, in silence and stillness of heart, I contemplate the one who loved me so much that he gave his life for me ...

I watch Mary Magdalene come to the tomb in the early morning. She sees that the stone has been taken from the entrance ... She does not look in, runs to find Simon and John, and returns after they leave the tomb (vv.1-10).

Now she stands alone outside the tomb. She stands, unable to leave, afraid to look into the darkness of the tomb. Her tears fall ... yet still she remains there. I watch with reverence ... I seek to understand those tears ... I sense that she seems frozen in her sorrow ...

I marvel now at her courage: "As she wept she stooped to look into the tomb." She faces her pain, her fear: she looks into the darkness of the tomb ... and finds that it is not as empty as she feared. A process begins that leads her from her tears to the Lord ...

The angels ask: "Woman, why are you weeping?" I hear this question directed to my heart as well: Why are you weeping? Why is your heart heavy as you live day by day?

She sees the "gardener," not recognizing Jesus who is already there with her, even as her tears fall ... "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek?" I answer this question, speaking to the Lord from my heart ...

"Jesus said to her 'Mary.'" Simply her name ... I hear him pronounce my name ... That one word says everything to me, as it does to Mary ...

"Rabboni!" One word ... which says everything. She knows now that he is alive, and will live forever, that he is with her, that his love will never leave her, that he calls her by name ... She is no longer the woman in tears ... I speak now to the Lord. I respond from my heart to his greeting ...

The encounter becomes mission: "Go to my brethren and say to them ..." "Mary Magdalene went and said to the disciples: 'I have seen the Lord.'" I feel the joy, the delight, the energy, with which she proclaims the risen Lord.

"I have seen the Lord." I speak with Mary Magdalene, I speak now with Jesus, and ask that this too be the central reality of my life, and my message to the world ...

Now I sit with Mary. I gaze upon her face, and see there her radiant joy. I see the deep happiness of knowing herself loved, loved infinitely, loved forever ... My heart now speaks ...

I am there, walking with the two disciples. I feel the heaviness of their hearts: "We had hoped ..." The energy of the beginnings is past, the time of trial and outward failure has come. They have seen Good Friday ... and, now, the tomb ... is empty, lifeless.

I walk with them along this country road ... I listen to them talk. I see the sadness on their faces. I, too, have known this sadness of a disciple, when all seems to go wrong, when I cannot make sense of what God is doing ...

Suddenly, Another is with us. He says little; he simply invites us to share the burdens of our hearts: "What is this conversation ...?" "What things?" They pour out their story of a hope that is now passed, of their struggle ...

I speak of my own hopes and disappointments ... And he listens ...

"O foolish men and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken!" He knows that they - and I - are not "hard" of heart, but only "slow" of heart. Too much has happened, too quickly, and they cannot grasp it in faith, cannot understand it. They falter ...

The Listener now speaks to their hearts. He "opens" to them the Scriptures and, slowly, they begin to understand ... "Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" "These things" – not the end of hope, but rather the necessary path toward glory ...

The "slow" heart becomes a heart on fire: "Did not our hearts burn within us ... while he opened to us the Scriptures?" I beg the divine Pilgrim, walking with me through life, for this same burning heart ...

"Stay with us ..." With them, I make this prayer from my heart to the Lord: Stay with me, Lord Jesus! "So he went in to stay with them ..."

We share the meal, the breaking of the bread. And our eyes are opened. Faith flames up, renewed within us. Discouragement is transformed into the surety that the risen Lord is always with me, today, every day, of my life.

Now everything changes for them, for me. They return, with energy, to the heart of the community. And they bear witness to the risen Lord in the midst of others: "They told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread."

Now I am alone with the Lord. My heart speaks freely to him ...
